#### Fundamentação do projeto

A disciplina de Inglês tem vindo a ser valorizada de ano para ano. Desde setembro de 2005 que foi criado o Programa de Generalização do Inglês no 1.º Ciclo do Ensino Básico para que cada vez mais cedo os alunos conheçam a língua inglesa e se familiarizem com a mesma. Segundo o *Programa de Inglês do 3.º Ciclo do Ensino Básico* a aprendizagem de uma língua estrangeira;

- Combina competência linguística e desenvolvimento pessoal e social;
- Cria oportunidades para o desenvolvimento de competências de comunicação oral e escrita;
- Educa a sensibilidade a sons e a ritmos e evidencia o valor das palavras e das estruturas frásicas;
- Promove a reflexão sobre o funcionamento da língua (estrangeira e materna);
- Exercita processos intelectuais e metacognitivos;
- Materializa abordagens multidisciplinares;
- Estimula a autoconfiança;
- Desenvolve a compreensão e o respeito por universos sócio-culturais diferenciados;

É indiscutível a forma como o Inglês se tornou uma língua de comunicação internacional por excelência e um instrumento fundamental para o uso das novas tecnologias. Aprender Inglês tornou-se cada vez mais uma necessidade imperiosa na formação dos alunos como forma de abrir horizontes, de gerar oportunidades de futuro e de criar uma consciência plurilingue e pluricultural, conforme o previsto no Quadro Europeu comum de Referência. Este documento pretende criar um fio condutor entre os diferentes sistemas educativos europeus, apresentando uma tabela com seis níveis de proficiência linguística, com descritores de desempenho. Estes níveis são reconhecidos não só na Europa, como também em países fora desta zona geográfica, facilitando a mobilidade entre países.

O *Portfolio Europeu das Línguas* apresenta estes níveis na perspetiva dos alunos ("sou capaz de"), ajudando-os a monitorizar a sua evolução no processo de aprendizagem. Estes descritores foram revistos em 2011 pela *European Association for Quality* 



Language Services (EAQUALS) e subdivididos em "níveis mais". Esta subdivisão foi tida em conta na elaboração das Metas Curriculares para o 2.º e 3.º ciclos e foi feita a correspondência adequada:

Apesar da preocupação do sistema educativo português em garantir o ensino do Inglês desde o 1.º ciclo, não houve qualquer adaptação do currículo até ao momento. Muitos dos conteúdos programáticos acabam por ser repetidos, sem serem devidamente aprofundados. O documento *Metas Curriculares de Inglês*, homologado a 13 de maio de 2013, apresenta-nos esta preocupação, tentando adaptar o programa da disciplina às diretrizes europeias:

Os programas de Inglês dos 2.º e 3.º ciclos apresentam um desfasamento em relação aos documentos com descritores de desempenho para a aprendizagem de línguas estrangeiras, apresentados pelo Conselho da Europa. Assim, na elaboração das Metas de Inglês, que têm como finalidade a competência comunicativa dos alunos e que se constituem como o documento de referência para o ensino, para a aprendizagem e para a avaliação interna e externa da língua, houve o cuidado de seguir as recomendações dos documentos europeus já referidos.

A preocupação da nossa instituição com esta realidade levou-nos a pensar num projeto inovador que colmatasse as lacunas existentes nas Orientações Programáticas de Inglês nos aproximasse dos requisitos definidos no Quadro Europeu Comum de Referência. Assim, a nossa busca pela qualidade de ensino levou-nos a estabelecer uma parceria com o Knighstbridge - Examination and Training Centre, uma das representantes de Cambridge em Portugal, uma Universidade reconhecida pela qualidade de ensino, que possui uma área de Language Assessment que se distingue pela preparação e certificação do nível de Inglês dos alunos, seguindo os níveis do Quadro Europeu Comum de Referência. O projeto Cambridge English será incorporado



desde a Educação Pré-escolar, para que os nossos alunos sejam capazes de adquirir a certificação, realizando exame no 2.º ou 3.º, 5.º, 7.º, 9.º anos. Os alunos são preparados para a realização de exames de Cambridge nas diversas competências (reading, writing, listening, speaking) e, desta forma, desenvolvem estas competências de forma sólida. Para tal, alguns conteúdos serão readaptados, garantindo o cumprimento programático previsto.

A realização de exames nos referidos anos tem como objetivo preparar os alunos para situações de avaliação, garantir a aquisição gradual de conhecimentos e certificar o nível de Inglês dos referidos alunos.


